My name is Aaron Smith, I'm the president of the Noblesville City Council, and on behalf of the 71,000 people who call the 9th largest city in the state of Indiana home, I'm elated to have you in Noblesville and introduce a dear friend of mine today.

I live downtown, just a few blocks north of the square, with my wife, Bronwen, and our kids. Having a young family is one of the many similarities that Chris Jensen and I have. He and Julie have four kids, we have two.
